
Portrait Photography

What is the difference between a picture of someone and a portrait?


A Portrait suggests a story and is interesting whether or not you know the person or people in the photograph

Composition Tools to create great portraits




Our eyes are naturally drawn to the points where these lines intersect (the pink circles)

Placing the subject in one of these intersections gives the photograph more balance and interest

Rule of thirds





Framing

Think about the setting (background) for your portrait, maybe choose a place that creates a natural frame around your subject.



Diagonals

Diagonals help guide your viewer's eyes to the main subject, purpose or story of your photograph.

Natural Light Source




All of these photos use natural light from outdoors to light their subjects and create shadows. Take your portraits by a windows, or better yet, go outside! Which photography concepts were used in this image?
